Local Fire Restriction and CALFIRE "Burn Bans"

The USFS Tahoe Basin Management Unit (TMU/TNF) and CAL FIRE (NEU/AEU) Units have fire restrictions and burn bans in place; as such, our local fire season officially began June 15, 2020 with our associated fire restriction. (California Fire Code 307.43 with locally-adopted amendments and ordinances) which place additional restrictions on recreational fires during fire season within the Districts. Our Fire Crews, Prevention Officers and Public Information Team are educating local residents and visitors about these new restrictions.

Following the adoption of the 2019 Fire Code, ONLY Natural Gas (NG) or Propane (LPG) outdoor firepits and barbecues, and pellet grills/smokers are allowed year-round, except during Red Flag/critical fire weather conditions. On Red Flag days all sources of open flames, including Natural Gas (NG) or Propane (LPG) outdoor firepits and barbecues, and pellet grills/smokers are prohibited. For reports of hazardous campfires, people should call 9-1-1. Fire crews have been responding regularly to reports of unauthorized/hazardous campfires and Barbecues. This suggests two good activities are taking place: we have an educated and alert community that is reporting suspicious fire activity; and our Engine Companies are extinguishing fires and educating the public on the regulation surrounding these types of fires.

While May 2020 was our slowest May in five-years with 123 calls, conversely, June was our busiest with 233 calls, 37 of those calls were in the Meeks Bay Fire response area. As summer progresses, it seems to be accompanied by a similar progressive increase in demands for emergency services. It has not been uncommon this month to have two, three, and four emergency incidents happening simultaneously, many in town, while others in our surrounding forest. Our fire and EMS crews continually step-up to these response challenges and, along with the Battalion Chiefs, Division Chiefs and myself, we are responding to these frequent simultaneous events, often after hours. While this year's COVID-19, 4th of July may have been short on fireworks displays it was robust with people enjoying the holiday, some being more cautious than others. The good news is our personnel continue to remain vigilant, with face coverings and other District directives, and we have kept a healthy and safe workforce which is necessary to serve our communities. The District has remained in "Step

One" of our normalization plan, all facilities remain closed to the general public, all stations, offices and services are fully staffed and operational.

Defensible Space and free-curbside chipping services are also in full swing meeting an increased demand for these types of services. I have been getting great feedback from the community related to the knowledge and professionalism of our three new inspectors. Additionally, contract crews have been completing forest fuels treatments in the NTPUD Regional Park and 871 California Tahoe Conservancy lots along the North and West shores. Completion of this volume of community work would not be possible without the great effort by our Forest Fuels Coordinator, Eric Horntvedt, federal grant funding and our cooperative agreements with North Lake Tahoe Fire Protection District, Meeks Bay Fire Protection District, Alpine Meadows County Water District, California Tahoe Conservancy and Tahoe Resource Conservation District.

Fire season is now in full swing. Personnel from North Tahoe Fire and Meeks Bay Fire, along with our fire agency cooperators have responded frequently to vegetation, debris and other fires. Because of the quick multijurisdictional responses, coupled with the increased staffing and available resources, the fires have been kept relatively small; abandoned campfires and dooryard burning are amongst the most frequent requests.


Out-of-county assignments: Our crews have responded to two, out-of-county, mutual aid fires: the Poleville Fire in Washoe County, and the Numbers Fire in Douglas County. In both instances our engines were credited with saving lives and property. Responding to mutual aid requests is an important function of a Fire District as it save lives and property of our neighbors, provides experience for our crews, is often reimbursed by the hosting agency, and come with an expectation of reciprocity should we need to request their assistance.



Re: Civil Unrest Response Best Practices

Date: June 9, 2020

All members, please review and provide me with any recommendations, thoughts, or concerns.

Due to current events nationally and throughout the State of California, North Tahoe Fire recognizes the need to send out some best practice recommendations to our members.

This memo is intended to provide a general guidance for North Tahoe Fire activities during civil unrest, civil disturbances, and violent encounters that may result in a prompt and coordinated action between fire and law enforcement.

Civil unrest conditions may present extreme hazards to our personnel. The potential dangers may include the usual hazards of fire plus the threat of physical injury from a variety of weapons, such as rocks, bottles, and firearms.

- Remember Responder Safety is always our Number #1 priority.
- Request that law enforcement be notified and respond accordingly.
- Ballistic vest, when issued, should be worn under bunker gear by all responding members.
- Shut off lights and sirens at least <u>three</u> blocks from scene, and they should not be used in the affected area.
- Keep apparatus compartments locked and equipment secure, if possible.
- Assess the need for additional assistance.
- Use caution and common sense to avoid increasing tensions. Avoid hostile verbal exchanges, gestures, or physical contact. Complete the assignment, if possible, and leave the scene.
- Position apparatus at intersections whenever possible to affect a rapid exit, if necessary. Always have an escape route, and post lookouts to monitor crowd activity.
- If in the company officer's opinion conditions present an unreasonable risk to the safety of members or to safe operations, leave the area immediately by the most expedient route, and notify GVECC of the same.
- Do not leave apparatus unattended, and always stay together as a crew.
- Unless a life hazard is present, an exterior attack using master streams from deck guns may be most effective. Depending on the number of fires in an area, fires that present no exposure hazard may be left to burn.
- Always maintain discipline, follow the chain of command, promote safety and good conduct, and behave in a professional manner.

Re: 4th of July Weekend 2020 Safety Message

Date: July 1, 2020

Attention, All Personnel:

Please review the information below regarding operating safely during the Fourth of July weekend.

Major Hazards and Risk:

- Be aware of impaired drivers.
- Remember to bracket roadway incident scenes.
- All personnel must wear Traffic Safety Vests, per policy, on all roadways incidents.
- Maintain hydration and remain alert to the potential dehydration of any member of the public.

Crowds:

- There may be limited access and egress.
- Use caution when operating and moving vehicles in crowds.
- Fireworks and open wood burning are illegal; respond and check the area for any signs of fire
- Assure scene safety and maintain crew integrity.
- Contact law enforcement and stage if necessary.
- When providing EMS care in crowds, attempt to remove the patient from the crowd and into a safe area as soon as possible. Utilize PCSO to assist you with this task, if necessary.

Tactical Patrol:

 Get out and visibly patrol your first due response area on July 3rd and 4th from 2030 to 2200 hours 4th of July Weekend 2020 Safety Message July 1, 2020 Page 2

Swift Water or Shore Zone Rescue:

- When responding to water rescue type calls, time is of the essence. Pre-position the gear. Get familiar with the pile of duffel bags and what's in them. Have your boot size and wetsuits all lined out.
- Always wear personal floatation devices when working in or around the water.

UTV-Backcountry Rescues:

- Use extreme caution while responding into the backcountry with possibly many inexperienced off-road drivers out there with you. Remember to check all equipment daily and wear proper safety gear. Confirm Tac channels and have a patient location prior to response.
- Always utilize helmets and restraints when operating the UTV.

Civil Unrest:

- Remember responder safety is always our #1 priority.
- Do not leave apparatus unattended, and always stay together as a crew.
- Always maintain discipline, follow the chain of command, promote safety and good conduct, and behave in a professional manner.

Re: Wildland Response During COVID

Date: July 9, 2020

Attention, All Personnel:

Please review the following guidelines regarding Wildland Response during COVID.

Priority Dispatch:

- Prescreening before departure, screening at the incident (by STEN) and screening when return.
- Operate under a "Module of One Concept" Stay within your group.
- Take hand sanitizer and cleaning supplies with crew.
- Be ready to respond as if it's our jurisdiction, bring PPE, Gowns and Masks.
- Be self-sufficient- Food and Water for 96 hours.
- If we are diverted to cover stations en route be able to provide the service as if it's our District.

Travel:

- Send only one into the store for supplies.
- Don't congregate with crowds.
- Minimize interaction with other crews.
- Communicate via cell phone.
- No unnecessary trips into town.

Operational:

- Maintain social distance and work within your module or assigned crew.
- Expect changes to traditional fire camps. No communal showers or dining.
- One person to attend briefing meetings and supply unit.
- Do not mix and match crews if possible.
- Wear a mask where social distancing CANNOT be maintained.
- Follow all camp guidelines and directions from the incident safety officer.

North Tahoe Fire and Meeks Bay Fire Protection Districts Prohibit ALL Open Burning and Recreational Fires

Tahoe City, Calif. June 12, 2019 — On Monday, June 15, 2019 CAL FIRE is suspending residential burn permits in the Tahoe Basin. This, along with the fire restrictions announced by the USFS Lake Tahoe Basin Management Unit on May 28, 2020, are the triggers that prompt North Tahoe Fire Protection District (NTFPD), Meeks Bay Fire Protection District (MBFPD), and Alpine Springs CWD jurisdictions to activate local fire restrictions by suspending all solid fuel recreational fires and open burning. The suspension takes effect Monday and will remain in effect through the remainder of fire season.

Subsequent to the adoption of the 2019 Fire Code, ONLY Natural Gas (NG) or Propane (LPG) outdoor firepits and barbecues, and pellet grills/smokers are allowed year-round except during **Red Flag**/critical fire weather conditions. All of these appliances must be utilized following manufacturer's recommendations.

All sources of open flames, including Natural Gas (NG) or Propane (LPG) outdoor firepits and barbecues, and pellet grills/smokers are prohibited during **Red Flag**/critical fire weather conditions. Red Flag Watches, Warnings and Advisories of critical fire weather in the Tahoe Basin are issued by the <u>National Weather Service, Reno</u>. For reports of hazardous camp fires, people should call 9-1-1.

"It is important that we obey fire restrictions. Sadly, illegal campfires continue to be the leading cause of wildfires in the Tahoe Basin." said NTFPD Fire Chief Michael Schwartz. "As California reopens and visitors begin returning to Lake Tahoe, it is important for residents and visitors to know that open-flame devices such as tiki torches and all fireworks, including sparklers and firecrackers, are illegal in California year-round."

NTFPD and MBFPD are asking residents to prepare for wildfire by maintaining a minimum of 100 feet of Defensible Space around every structure. "It's essential for residents to effectively maintain defensible space on their property, which improves their home's chance of survivability from both surface fires and ember showers." Said NTFPD Fire Marshal Steve McNamara. "To support these efforts, we offer free defensible space inspections to our residents, and free residential curbside chipping is available through fire districts basin-wide."

Here are some tips to help prepare homes and property for wildfire:

- Maintain at least 5 feet free of combustible material around each structure.
- For a distance of at least 30 feet from the home, keep the area Lean, Clean and Green.
- Clear all dead and or dying vegetation 100 feet from all structures.
- Landscape with <u>fire resistant/drought tolerant plants</u>.
- Find alternative ways to dispose of landscape debris through chipping or green waste collection opportunities.
